Effective summer programs have structured content that aligns to the school year, meets students needs, and enhances student engagement. Keys for Academic and Enrichment Activities

Use high-quality instructional materials for summer academic activities

Boost attendance with engaging enrichment opportunities

Ensure instructors are properly trained and supported in the use of materials Align enrichment with student needs and interests

Enrichment Activities & Opportunities

Enrichment activities should vary by age group so that they can link to student needs and interests. Older students will prefer different activities and have different needs compared to younger students.

Enrichment helps programs feel like **summer camp**, increasing attractiveness for families

Adding enrichment allows for **full-day programming**, which benefits working families

CBOs offer opportunities for enrichment **beyond** those typically offered in schools

Partnering with Community Based Organizations

Benefits

- Increase diversity of enrichment offerings
- Help with enrichment staffing
- Reduce overall costs of the program
- Support student recruitment

Considerations

- Ongoing collaboration is key
- Consistent communication
- Clear expectations of purpose
- Define roles and responsibilities

Academic Curriculum

A common, high-quality curriculum helps ensure **consistency** and **equity** in student experiences and supports teachers. Use high-quality curriculum materials matched to student needs

- Provide lesson plans **aligned** with school-year **standards**
- If serving broad achievement levels, provide **differentiated activities** within daily lesson plans

• Provide **support** to teachers implementing curriculum

Woonsocket Program Content:

Academic Curriculum & Enrichment Activities Academic Curriculum: 9:00 AM - 12:00 PM

Designed and implemented by school-based teams. Experiential, academic learning that focused on a different theme each session.

Lunch at School Sites & Busing to CBO Site

Enrichment Activities: 12:00 PM - 4:00 PM (or later)

Designed and implemented by CBO partners, in collaboration with school-based teams. Hosted on-site at CBOs across the city.

Woonsocket Program Themes by School

Academic curriculum was developed by school-based teams, aligned with student needs, and designed to match the session theme. The district created planning time and teachers were compensated for planning before the summer program started.
